Presidential Determinations

- April 22: Immigrant eligibility
- June 22: Nonimmigrant eligibility
- May 29: Chinese graduate students and postdocs
- July 6: International students/July 24 revisions

Geographic Limitations

- Schengen region, UK, Ireland
- China
- Brazil
- Iran

Consular Operations

- Phased re-openings (DOS July 14 announcement)
- Individual operations
- Emergency appointment policies
- Machine Readable Visa (MRV) fee
- Medical exam and issued IV



H-1B, H-2B, L-1, J-1 Restrictions

- Who is affected
- Basic rule no visa issuance
- Exceptions
- Spouses and children
- Open issues: new visa applications



H-1B, H-2B, L-1, J-1 Restrictions

- June 24, 2020 December 31, 2020
- Outside the US on June 24, 2020
- H1B, H2B and H4 applicants
- J1 interns, trainees, teachers, camp counselors, au pairs, summer work/travel
- L1 executive, managers, specialized knowledge



NIV Restrictions: Exemptions

- Lawful Permanent Residents
- Spouse/child of U.S. Citizen
- Services essential to food chain
- National Interest exemption
- Other: current visa stamp in category
- Canadians (visa exempt)



National Interest Exemption

- Critical to the defense, law enforcement, diplomacy or national security
- Provision of medical care to COVID-19 patients or COVID-19 research
- Economic recovery of the US
- Consular determination

Quarantine and Testing Requirements

- No quarantine or testing rules at the federal level
- Quarantine and testing rules at state level
 - Mandatory v. advisory
 - Self-reporting through online health form
 - Quarantine
 - Pre-arrival or post-arrival testing



Role of Carriers (denial of boarding rights)

- For visas issued under the "national interest" exclusion, request Consulate to arrange for a CPB letter of admissibility
- May need to address quarantine requirements as a term to board carrier

Satisfactory Departure

- Impossibility of departure
- Extension policies
- Visa Waiver (ESTA) considerations

Global Restrictions

- U.S.-Canada and U.S.-Mexico border closures
- Travel restrictions for U.S. citizens
- Quarantine, testing, and health declaration/disclosure requirements
- Limited staff to assist at US consulates around the world

Judicial Challenges

- Gomez v. Trump, et al (AILA suit)
- National Association of Manufacturers et al. v. DHS (U.S. Chamber of Commerce)
- Panda, et al. v. Wolf (Indian nationals)
